# On the complex SEE change and systems of ordinary differential equations 

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#### Abstract

In this paper, we present the properties and meaning of the new indispensable change, called complex SEE the change. Farther, we use the complex SEE integral change to solve systems of ordinary differential equations (ODEs).


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## 1. Introduction

(ii) $S^{c}\left[f^{\prime \prime}(t)\right]=\frac{-f^{\prime}(0)}{v^{n}}-\frac{i f(0)}{v^{n-1}}-v^{2} T(i v)$.
(iii) In general case:

## Arrangement of Ordinary Differential Equations (ODEs)

The complex SEE integral change method is compelling for the arrangement of the response of a direct system represented by an standard differential condition to the underlying conditions and (or) to an external disturbance. More precisely, we seek the arrangement of a linear framework for its state at subsequent time $t>0$ due to the initial state $t=0$ and (or) to the unsettling influence applied fort $>0$.

## Complex SEE Change System O.D.Es

Example 1.2. (Arrangement of first request conventional differential conditions)
Think about the accompanying framework:

Introducing the matrices

The solution of the algebraic system is:

Expanding these determinates, results for $\overline{x_{1}}(v)$ and $\overline{x_{2}}(v)$ can promptly be transformed and the arrangements $x_{-} 1(t)$ and $x_{-} 2(t)$ can be found in shut structures.

Example 1.3. Settle the arrangement of the standard differential conditions:

After simple computations, we have

$$

By taking inverse SEE change, we have

$$

Also

\end{array}\right|}=\frac{3(i v-2)}{v^{n}}-\frac{16}{v^{n}} \\
(i v-2)(i v-1)-6 \\
\bar{y}=\frac{1}{v^{n}} \frac{(3 i v-6-16)}{i^{2} v^{2}-3 i v+2-6}=\frac{1}{v^{n}}\left[\frac{3 i v-22}{(i v-4)(i v+1)}\right]
\end{gathered}
$$

We have $A=-2, B=5$, then:

\end{gathered}
$$

Take inverse of complex SEE change, we obtain:

$$

Example 1.4. consider a system of linear ordinary differential equation

taking complex SEE change of equation (1.4), we have

Now, using the property, complex SEE change of the derivative of the function in equation (1.6), we get:

=\frac{1}{v^{n}}\left[\frac{\frac{i v^{3}-i v+2 i v}{v^{2}-1}}{-\left(v^{2}+1\right)}\right]=\frac{1}{v^{n}}\left[\frac{i v\left(v^{2}+1\right)}{-\left(v^{2}+1\right)\left(v^{2}-1\right)}\right] \\
=\frac{-1}{v^{n}}\left[\frac{i v}{v^{2}-1}\right]
\end{gathered}

The solution is

## Problem of System Pharmacokinetics

Solution of the problem for the system pharmacokinetics

$$

& \frac{d}{d t} C_{1}(t)+\lambda C_{1}(t)=\frac{\gamma}{V O L} C_{2}(t) \text { with } C_{1}(0)=C_{2}(0)=1 \text { and } t>0 \\
& \frac{d}{d t} C_{2}(t)+3 \lambda C_{2}(t)=\frac{1}{V O L} C_{1}(t)
\end{aligned}
$$

Here $C_{1}(t)$ and $C_{2}(t)$ : at any time $t$, the medications concentration in the blood $t$
$\lambda$ : consistent speed of end.
$\gamma$ : the proportion of implantation (in $\mathrm{mg} / \mathrm{min}$ ).
$V O L$ : volume in which drug is distributed.
Taking complex SEE change of the above system, we have

& S^{c}\left[C_{2}^{\prime}(t)\right]+3 \lambda S^{c}\left[C_{2}(t)\right]=\frac{1}{V O L} S^{c}\left[C_{1}(t)\right]
\end{aligned}
$$

Now, using the property of the function in above equation, we get

& \frac{-1}{v^{n}} C_{1}(0)+i v \overline{C_{1}}+\lambda \overline{C_{1}}=\frac{\gamma}{V O L} \overline{C_{2}} \\
& \frac{-1}{v^{n}} C_{2}(0)+i v \overline{C_{2}}+3 \lambda \overline{C_{2}}=\frac{1}{V O L} \overline{C_{1}} \\
& (i v+\lambda) \overline{C_{1}}-\frac{\gamma}{V O L} \overline{C_{2}}=\frac{1}{v^{n}} \\
& \frac{-1}{V O L}+(i v+3 \lambda) \overline{C_{2}}=\frac{1}{v^{n}} \\
& \overline{C_{1}}(v)=\frac{\left|\begin{array}{cc}
\frac{1}{v^{n}} & (i v+\lambda) \\
\frac{1}{v^{n}} & \frac{-1}{V o L}
\end{array}\right|}{\left|\begin{array}{cc}
i v+\lambda & \frac{-v}{V o L} \\
\frac{-1}{V o L} & (i v+3 \lambda)
\end{array}\right|}(i v+\lambda)(i v+3 \lambda)-\frac{-1}{v^{n}(V o L)}-\frac{(i v+\lambda)}{v^{n}}(i v o L)^{2}
\end{aligned}

After simple computations and take inverse we get $\overline{C_{1}}(t)$.
Similarly, we get $\overline{C_{2}}(t)$
